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Non-Medical Care Professionals in Home Care- Personal Care Aide

Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the initial training requirements.

- Currently, the Connecticut Department of Health has no training requirements for caregivers (PCA's) in private homecare.
- HCP recommends our 8-hour Non-Medical Care Professional Certification Series.

Ongoing Training Requirements:

- Currently there are no hourly training requirements for caregivers (PCA's) in Connecticut homecare.
- HCP recommends 6-12 hours of additional training annually.

Health Aides-CNA also called HHHA/HHA

Link to regulation: : Title 42-Chapter IV- Sub G -Part 484- Subpart B

Federal/State Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does not meet federal/State initial training requirements.

- Federal Training Regulations require Home Health Aides to become **certified through an approved school/training program** as <u>Certified Nursing Assistants.</u>
- Nursing Aide in Connecticut must obtain at least 100 clock hours of a Nurse Aide Training Program and pass both sections of the Prometric's CNA Competency Exam.
- In Connecticut, a HHA is referred to as a homemaker-home health aide.

Ongoing Training Requirements:

- Home health aides must complete 12 hours of in-service training per year.

Hospice Aides-CNA/HHA

Link to federal regulation: eCFR :: 42 CFR Part 418 -- Hospice Care

Federal/State Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does not meet training requirements.

- Hospice Aides are often referred to as home health aides (HHAs) and certified nursing assistants (CNAs)
 Training must be provided by an <u>approved training school/program</u>.
- Nursing Aide in Connecticut must obtain at least 100 clock hours of a Nurse Aide Training Program and pass both sections of the Prometric's CNA Competency Exam.

Federal Ongoing Training Requirements:

- A hospice aide must receive at least **12 hours** of in-service training during each 12-month period. Inservice training may occur while an aide is furnishing care to a patient.

Direct Care Professionals in ALFs

Link to regulation: Department of Public Health (DPH) Assisted Living Services Agencies (ALSAs)

Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the initial training requirements.

- <u>The Department of Public Health</u> requires all staff to complete a **10-hour** topic specific orientation and pass a competency exam completed by the facility.
- (Orientation training topics may vary depending on the specific ALF.)
- HCP recommends the 8- Hour Caregiver Certification Series

Ongoing Training Requirements:

- All staff must complete 6 hours of annual in-service training based on population and facility needs.
- 8 hours of dementia-specific training within the first 6 months of employment.

Direct Care Professionals in SNFs- Certified Nursing Assistant

Link to regulation: :CFR-2019-title42-vol5,part483-subpartD

Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does not meet the training requirements.

- Nursing assistants/aides working in licensed and or certified skilled nursing facilities, intermediate care facilities must be **certified through an approved school/training program** as Certified Nursing Assistants.
- Nursing Aide in Connecticut must obtain at least 100 clock hours of a Nurse Aide Training Program and pass both sections of the Prometric's CNA Competency Exam.

Ongoing Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the training requirements.

- The Federal regulation requires CNAs to have at least 12 hours of continuing education per year to become recertified.
- Connecticut requires all nursing home staff who care for residents with dementia to complete **8 hours** of dementia-specific training within the first **6** months of employment.
- HCP recommends the- <u>HCP Alzheimer's & Dementia Specialist Learning Path</u>. This 8.5 Hour learning path includes (7) courses all recognized by the Alzheimer's Association.
