Non-Medical Care Professionals in Home Care-Personal Care Aide

Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does meet training requirements.

Any PCA hired after the effective date of these rules (2013) must have one of the following trainings **and/or** experience:

- Successful completion of a nurse aide training and competency evaluation program.
- Successful completion of a competency examination for nurse aides.
- Successful completion of a health care or personal care credentialing program.
- Successful completion or progress in the completion of a **40-hour** training program provided by a private home care provider.
 - **Twenty hours** of the program must be completed by the employee prior to serving clients.
 - The additional **twenty hours** must be completed within six months of the date the training initially began.

Home Health Aide -Certified Nursing Assistant

Federal Initial Certification Training Requirements:

HCP does not meet training requirements.

• Federal Training Regulations require Home Health Aides to **become certified through an approved school/training program** as Certified Nursing Assistants.

Ongoing Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the training requirements.

- Home health aides must complete 12 hours of in-service training per year.

Hospice Aides- CNA/HHA/PCA

Link to regulation: eCFR :: 42 CFR Part 418 -- Hospice Care

Federal/State Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does not meet the Federal initial training requirements.

HCP does have training that can help support the PCA training program requirements.

Personal care aides considered qualified by training and experience to provide services to patients include:

- Georgia Certified Nursing Aides with current certification
- Individuals who have completed and can provide validation or documentation of completion of a home health aide training and competency evaluation.
- Individuals who have successfully completed a <u>personal care aide-training program</u>, provided by the hospice under the direction of a registered nurse.
 - Conducted through classroom and supervised practical training totaling at least **75 hours.**
 - **16 of the 75 hours** of training must be devoted to supervised practical training which must be completed prior to beginning practical training.

Federal/State Ongoing Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the training requirements.

- A hospice aides/PCA's must receive at least 12 hours of in-service training during each 12-month period. Inservice training may occur while an aide is furnishing care to a patient.

Direct Care Professionals in ALFs – Direct Care Staff

Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the training requirements.

- All direct care staff working at any assisted living environment in Georgia are required to complete work related training within the first 60 days of hire.
- Direct care staff must also complete additional training in the provision of CPR and emergency first-aid, and all employees must be trained to administer basic first aid.

Ongoing Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the training requirements.

- Direct care staff must complete 24- hours of continuing education during the first year of employment.
- 16 hours annually after the 1st year.
- Additional 8- hours per year for memory care unit staff. HCP recommends our 8-hour <u>Specialist-Learning-Paths-Alzheimers.pdf (homecarepulse.com)</u>

Direct Care Professionals in SNFs- Certified Nursing Assistant

Initial Training Requirements:

HCP does not meet training requirements.

- To become a CNA in Georgia, you must complete a state-approved <u>CNA training program/ school</u> that consists of a minimum of 85 hours of training, including classroom instruction and supervised clinical practice.
- After completing the program, students must pass a competency exam to obtain CNA certification.

Ongoing Training Requirements:

HCP does meet the training requirements.

• The Federal regulation requires CNAs to have at least 12 hours of continuing education per year to become recertified.
