## **Initial Training Requirements:**

## **HCP does** meet training requirements.

 Non-Medical Care Professionals providing hands-on home care who are not listed on the North Carolina nurse aide registry must complete training and competency in the following topic areas:

 CMS Training Regulations require Home Health Aides to become certified through an approved school/training program as Certified Nursing Assistants.

## **Ongoing Training Requirements:**

- Home health aides must complete 12 hours of in-service training per year.

# **Hospice Aides-** Certified Nursing Assistants also referred to as HHA.

Link to regulation: eCFR :: 42 CFR Part 418 -- Hospice Care

## **Federal Initial Training Requirements:**

HCP does not meet the Federal initial training requirements.

Hospice Aides are often referred to as home health aides (HHAs) and certified nursing assistants (CNAs)
Training must be provided by an approved training school/program.

#### **State Initial Training Requirements:**

HCP does meet the ongoing training requirements.

North Carolina, requires all hospice staff to complete 12 hours of in-service topic training as follows:

and dying; bereavement;	
The concept of the hospice family;	Emotional Losses in the Elderly

Infection control;	An Infection Control Update
Safety;	Client Safety Tips
Confidentiality; and	Maintaining Confidentiality
Patient rights.	Bill of Rights

#### **Federal Ongoing Training Requirements:**

HCP does meet the ongoing training requirements.

- A hospice aide must receive at least 12 hours of in-service training during each 12-month period.

# Direct Care Professionals in ALFs- Personal Care Staff

# Direct Care Professionals in SNFs- Certified Nursing Assistant

Link to regulation: CFR-2019-title42-vol5, part483-subpartD

## **Initial Training Requirements:**

HCP does not meet the initial training requirements.

• In North Carolina, CNAs must complete a state-approved must complete a state approved nurse aide training school/program.

## **Ongoing Training Requirements:**

HCP does meet the ongoing training requirements.

- The Federal regulation requires CNAs to have at least 12 hours of continuing education per year to become recertified.
- North Carolina requires that the facility complete a performance review of every nurse aide at least once every 12 months and must provide regular in-service education based on the outcome of these reviews.
